Turning Points

In the calendar year, it's January. It's 2025. The new calendar year is a turning point that reminds us to consider the blessings and losses of the past, and the hopes and challenges of walking faithfully into the future. So we might pray with Howard Thurman (A Prayer for The New Year from Meditations of The Heart):

"God,

Grant that I may pass through the coming year with a faithful heart. There will be much to test me and make weak my strength before the year ends.

In my confusion I shall often say the word that is not true and do the thing of which I am ashamed.

There will be errors in the mind and great inaccuracies of judgment. In seeking the light, I shall again and again find myself walking in the darkness.

I shall mistake my light for Your light and I shall drink from the responsibility of the choice I make...

Though my days be marked with failures, stumblings, fallings, let my spirit be free so that You may take it and redeem my moments in all the ways my needs reveal.

Give me the quiet assurance of Your Love and Presence. Grant that I may pass through the coming year with a faithful heart. Amen"

In the church year, we begin in the middle of the twelve-day season of Christmas, the celebration of God being born and living as a human being with a mortal body just like ours. Then we turn to

Epiphany, and to the season after Epiphany. Epiphany is on January 6. An epiphany is a revealing, a manifestation, a sudden knowing. Epiphany comes from two Greek words that translate as "the light shows forth" or "the light comes to." In other words, Epiphany is when we momentarily see the light of God shining through our lives.

We might have an epiphany, a dazzling experience of God, in a way that's predictable and expected—at worship, at a church camp, through a friend of deep faith—but we might have an epiphany down by a river or at a wedding reception or some other unexpected way. For example, the Magi or Persian astrologers come to Jesus in a way that is outside the norm, beyond conventional understanding, outside the formulas for church growth and evangelism. Epiphany reminds us that God is available to all and is found along unexpected paths, including paths that we wouldn't have taken or that make us uncomfortable.

All of the scripture stories and texts we hear in worship this month are epiphanies. These epiphanies don't just bedazzle; they are turning points that invite us to live differently, to see differently, to further open ourselves to God's holy presence. So this month we'll be invited to slow ourselves, to quiet ourselves, to open ourselves, to set aside expectations, to be curious, to walk, to listen, to watch, to observe, to ask questions, to wonder, to see with depth, to seek the aliveness that comes from God, and turns our lives in new directions.

Consistory 2024 Highlights: We had a memorable year with several notable events. We experienced a busy weekend celebrating the 40th anniversary of the dedication of our church building to God combined with hosting a Community Block Party. Several outdoor worship services with picnic lunches were held under the ever-expanding branches of our "Princess Tree" and we celebrated birthdays the first Sunday of the month with fellowship and snacks following worship. The Spring Grove Alumni Chorus and our Trombone friends were with us providing service music. Youth workcamp, VBS, a ramp-build, drive-thru Nativity, soup sales, and the creation of a Heritage Grove and gathering area engaged many individuals. Various service projects providing food and health care items were once again supporting those in need.

Many of those activities had expenses that were partially or totally covered by disbursements from our Special Gifts Funds. Our daily operating expenses, salaries, utilities, and work of our committees are covered through your weekly/monthly giving. This year, in particular, we've seen a large increase, beyond what we originally budgeted, in some of those expenses. Our total giving has not kept pace with these expense increases and so we've experienced a decrease in our Current Fund. Please make every effort possible to do what you can toward the goal of meeting our 2025 budget while maintaining the strong outreach support of which we are so grateful.

Monthly Mission Offering: Safe Communities

The mission of Safe Communities is to **Educate** adults about how to keep children safe from sexual abuse; **Engage** organizations, institutions, and congregations in developing cultures that prioritize abuse prevention through best practices, policies, and training; **Empower** adult survivors through new models of healing, including education, trauma-informed groups, and peer-based learning.



As we greet the New Year and make our New Year's resolutions whether we write them down or just think about them most of us can't resist the opportunity for new beginnings. Poverty is listed as one of the health issues for January. Perhaps we can each think about what we can do as individuals about one of our country's leading problems, which is poverty. Based on 2017 numbers from the World Bank, a little bit less than 700 million people were living on less than \$2.15 a day, which is the new international poverty line as of the fall 2022. And while the number has declined since 1990, it is still too high.



In the United States the official poverty rate was 11.4 percent in 2020 (The pre-pandemic rate in 2019 was 10.5 percent) The good news is that with 2020 being the exception we've seen an annual decline to the U.S. poverty rates five years in a row. However, there are still about 37million people living in poverty in the United States. In this article I found, here are powerful poverty quotes from leaders and activists leading charges.

She chose to attend Lancaster Theological Seminary, and completed her Masters of Divinity in 2024. While at LTS, she learned about and got involved with UCC churches in the area. She became a member of Faith UCC and has led worship in other UCC churches. She has attended PCCUCC meetings and is Secretary of our York Association.

"In the Bulb, there is a Flower"

It was 2004, and a very emotional and important decision was being made that would greatly impact **York's Emmanuel UCC** on East Market Street. Attendance had been quite low each week, and maintaining the church was simply not possible. The congregation had previously written a "Living Will" that required the church to do a self-examination if a lower attendance or low financial marker was met. Church members were wondering how they could walk away from a gorgeous building that was such a spiritual and meaningful part of their lives, some for their entire lives. It was heart-wrenching to think about going elsewhere. Margaret Sultner, who has attended Emmanuel for over seventy years, remembered this time. "I was a member since I was six, and I knew nothing else. It was hard to let go of a home away from home."

Emmanuel's pastor at the time, Rev. Della Fahnestock, surprised many in the congregation with an innovative proposal. Perhaps Emmanuel could live on in a unique way--continuing its commitment to share faith and community outreach, but without a building. With much prayer, discussion and open minds, Pastor Della and about twenty interested people created a new reality and vision for the church, "traveling light" as Jesus had done.

Twenty years later, Emmanuel remains an active member of the United Church of Christ and is thriving as a home for spiritual sojourners. Decisions are made through a consensus-building process. The congregation identifies as "covenant participants" instead of "church members" and renews their covenant yearly. Those who desire a connection to the church but without joining are "Friends of Emmanuel." The church's Living Will is reviewed yearly and updated when needed, ensuring that the church remains healthy. The church also is intentionally small, under thirty covenant participants. According to the Living Will, if attendance grows to 40, a second church planting would be considered.

As followers of Jesus, committed to "traveling light," the congregation has needed to be flexible about meeting spaces. Over the years, worship services have been in a room at a Community Center as well as in a hotel conference room. For the past five years, Hayshire UCC has generously rented its Fellowship Hall to Emmanuel for Sunday worship.

Since its 2004 restart, wonderful pastors have led Emmanuel. For the first eighteen years, there were settled pastors Rev. Della Fahnestock, Rev. Kay Rader, Rev. Mike Loser, and Rev. Laura Ramsey, as well as Interim minister, Rev. Rick Pulling and supply pastor, Rev. Dominique Denman. Since 2022, the church has continued to thrive without a settled pastor. Instead, a flow of diverse supply pastors has added dimension to the church: MiD Spring Davidson, Rev. Joslin Kearse, Rev. Megan Mathieson, and currently MiD Jamie Gruber. Everyone agrees that the congregation has spiritually grown through their presence.

Emmanuel's congregation size and weekly attendance have been steady during the last twenty years, with between ten and twenty attending in person or, since Covid, also over Zoom. The church's Mission Statement, read together weekly, includes that the church will, "...actively sustain a creative and constructive presence in the world.," making a commitment to live faith outside of "church." With no building issues to take care of, money and energy can be used elsewhere. Tithing to Our Church's Wider Mission is built into Emmanuel's annual budget. Zooming services two Sundays a month saves rent money for quarterly charitable donations. As a Creation Justice congregation, Emmanuel cares for God's creation by tending trees at Nixon Park, writing environmental voting postcards, hosting guest speakers, collecting plastic and paper for recycling, and together reading and discussing books on environmental issues. As the first Open and Affirming congregation in the York area, Emmanuel has been supporting our LGBTQIA+ siblings, sponsoring and attending events, and creating a safe worship space for all.

Additional church outreach has included: Sandwich sales and a yearly yard sale, with all proceeds going to a girls' school in Kenya; writing Letters to the Editor on a variety of issues, such as book banning; volunteering at Mr. Sandy's Veteran Center to do clean ups, and providing meals and treats to the homeless veterans. In recent years, the church has donated supplies and packed backpacks to Church World Service, participated in the Race Against Racism and annual CROP Hunger Walks, prepped food at the York County Food Alliance "Squash Hunger," and led sing-alongs at Margaret Moul Home. During the Covid lockdown, Emmanuel sent monthly donations to local charitable organizations.

Worship is interactive at Emmanuel, including alternative versions of the Prayer of Our Savior, "Readers Theater," and sometimes a Fruit Salad Communion. After the one-hour service, there is an hour of open and respectful discussion, in which all ideas are welcome. Listening to and learning from one another is essential. Another essential is Music. The congregation loves to harmonize when meeting in person, especially during its favorite hymns. One such hymn, "In the Bulb There is a Flower" by Natalie Sleeth, has lyrics that seem to touch directly on the church's story. The second stanza includes, "...from the past will come the future; what it holds, a mystery, unrevealed until its season, something God alone can see." For the past twenty years, this congregation has seen God's mystery unfolding in so many ways. May God continue to reveal God's self well into the future, at Emmanuel UCC York!

Our world around us is changing ever more rapidly as is the spiritual landscape on which we are situated. Hanging on to the past may offer succor and comfort but is not a path to church health. For our churches and our authorized ministers to be as vital and adaptable as we will need to be, we will all need to work more closely together. As your Council President for the next two years, I aim to "bless the ties that bind" and exercise those ties as much as possible.
