Season of Creation: Our Common Home

The Season of Creation is a month-long time (September 1 to October 6) to celebrate God as Creator, the ongoing gift of God's creation, and our role as lovers and caretakers of God's creation. Inspired by a rich tradition of the Orthodox Church, it was later embraced by the World Council of Churches in 2008 and the Catholic Church in 2015. Along the way, Protestant churches and denominations around the world began encouraging that the Season of Creation be honored. Our church began honoring the Season of Creation in 2019.

Of course, like the households of many of our members, we began honoring God's creation long before that. The labor of many has shaped our beautiful church grounds and gardens. We situated a gazebo to afford fine views of the fields, woodlands, and high hills around us, and tiny aspect of the beauty of the world, our common home.

So it is appropriate that this year our theme is "Our Common Home." The theme has its roots in the Greek word, oikos, or household. In the first century, individuals and nuclear families for the most part did not live in their own homes. Rather, extended families lived together with servants under one roof as a household. Maintaining family relationships was one purpose of a household; producing goods and services was another purpose, whether the family ran a farm or a masonry workshop. Every household had to manage their business.

So it might not surprise you that the Greek words for household (oikos) management are the root of the modern term, eco-nomy.

What if God's created world was a household (*oikos*), our common home? How could we understand the logic of this household, this common home? We would study *eco-logy*.

What if we believed that church households around the world should be in conversation? *Ecumenism*, from the Greek word "oikoumene," (see oikos hidden in that word?) meaning "the whole inhabited world," is the promotion of cooperation and unity among Christians.

These different ways that the Greek word for household can be employed gives us a window to see the connections between our financial economy, the web of life that God is creating, and Christ's Spirit which is in and through our Common Home.

Dear Friends, This month I'm writing about atrial fibrillation (AFib), a common heart

condition that often goes undiagnosed.

Atrial Fib


AFib is the most common type of irregular heartbeat that often causes the heart to beat too quickly. One of

the biggest concerns of AFib is the risk of strokes. In fact, people with AFib have at least 5 times greater risk of stroke than those who do not have AFib. In fact, it is projected by 2030 approximately 12 million people in the United States will have AFib.

Symptoms can come and go. They include *irregular heartheat, racing heart, chest pain, shortness of breath, fatigue and light headedness*. If you have these symptoms, you should discuss them with your physician. You need to see your health care provider to determine if it is AFib or another condition.

Risk factors include age 65 or older, high blood pressure, diabetes, sleep apnea, heavy alcohol use, heart disease such as congestive heart failure and coronary artery disease, prior heart attack, smoking, obesity and overactive thyroid.

Atrial fibrillation is most often caused by changes to the heart's tissue or the electrical signaling that helps the heart to beat. Drinking lots of water helps with AFib. Adequate water intake ensures optional blood circulation, delivery water removal, blood pressure regulation, heart rate, and electrolyte balance. All vital functions. Dehydration can increase AFib by starving the heart and disrupting electrolyte balance.

Mission Statement

We, the members of the York Association of the United Church of Christ, are called by God and empowered by the Holy Spirit to represent Christ by:

Democracy in the Church

Recently, I needed to check on a quotidian question of governance in our congregation. When I found a copy of our church's forty-year-old constitution (I don't look at it very often), the first word of its three-sentence long preface caught my eye: "Democracy." Democracy has been in the news a lot recently. Some say roadblocks are being put in the way of those who should be able to vote; others that there are not enough roadblocks to prevent those who should not vote from voting. Seldom does the news discuss why democracy is or is not important. The preface of our church's constitution attempts to address the why question.

"Democracy, in the church as in the surrounding culture, is a way to guide between tyranny and anarchy," the preface begins. In this statement I hear echoes of the battles against fascism in WWII and totalitarian communism in the Cold War. I also hear echoes of the Reformation protest of top-down ways of doing church, and dismay at the decade's long religious wars and chaos that followed the Reformation among the German principalities and in England and Scotland. Democracy is a ship that steers between having only one person's convictions count and having everyone's convictions count, but no way to address differing convictions other than indifference or violence.

The simplest definition of democracy might be "one person, one vote." Sometimes churches habitually use this form of democracy. When differences arise in these churches, there is a vote, and the majority rules—even if the majority is less invested in their vote than the minority, and even if the minority is not encouraged to give full voice to their convictions. The minority may feel unheard and unloved. Jesus' command to love our neighbors as ourselves may go unheeded.

Perhaps that is why the second sentence reads, "The governance of God cannot be equated with democracy, nor the discovery of God's will with any human ordering principle." Here is a caution against worshipping democracy or making an idol out of it. God has engaged and led God's people through all sorts of governing arrangements, even some that were utterly hostile to God's will. That is one reason why I find Christ crucified and resurrected so compelling. Perhaps we should join with Winston Churchill in his humble assessment of democracy: "Democracy is the worst form of government, except for all the others."

So, the preface to our church's constitution concludes: "'Rather, God's kingdom exists within us, above, beneath us and beyond us, "that your faith might not rest on the wisdom of men [sic], but on the power of God.' (1 Cor 2:5)" In other words, God's reigning is embedded in the very fabric of life and human relationships. We need to be attentive to God's reigning.

Jesus does not give us step-by-step instructions for how to do this. Rather, in comparing God's reign to a farmer who scatters seed, or to a farmer who scatters mustard seed, or to a woman who leavens a huge quantity of flour with yeast, etc. he invites us to engage in imagining the world God desires, a world shaped by mercy and grace, flourishing and abundance. We are to be attentive to God's ways of kindness and compassion. God's reigning is a vision to for faithful people to live for, and to live by. To live into God's reigning calls for deep listening to God and one another and God's creation. For sharing from the heart. For healing, patience, and kindness. Loving relationships are both the means and the end of our decision-making, individually and corporately. Easier said than done. And often harder than simply "one person, one vote."

How does your congregation assess democracy in its life, and its relationship with our York Association and Penn Central Conference? Your reflections are welcome, especially in time for our October and November newsletters.
